
Early Meetings

At this meeting, President Wycoff suggested that the Society should be disbanded. Eventually, this change was reflected in a name change. In 1964 the Society changed its name from Electron Microscope Society to Electron Microscopy Society. A major source of strength of the Society has been the cross-discipline nature of the applications of microscopy.
